# SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ADMINISTRATION (SAMHSA)

#### **Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (MHBG)**

The MHBG awards funding to states to supplement existing mental health services and/or to fund new activities. Services supported by the MHBG include outpatient treatment for serious mental illnesses, such as schizophrenia and bipolar disorders; supported employment and supported housing; rehabilitation services; crisis stabilization and case management; peer specialist and consumer-directed services; wraparound services for children and families; jail diversion programs; and services for at-risk populations. The additional \$35 million sought by MHLG would fund a Mental Health Block Grant 5 percent set-aside to fund state implementation of the components of the Crisis Now model of crisis services.

#### Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SAPT)

The SAPT block grant distributes funds to eligible states and territories to plan, carry out, and evaluate substance abuse prevention, treatment, and recovery support services for individuals, families, and communities impacted by substance abuse. In 2015, SAPT accounted for approximately 32 percent of total state substance abuse agency funding and 23 percent of total state substance abuse prevention and public health funding. Outcome measures from the most recent year for which data is available show that the SAPT has been successful in expanding treatment capacity by supporting approximately two million admissions to treatment programs receiving public funding.

# Promoting Integration of Primary and Behavioral Health Care (PIPBHC) and National Center of Excellence for Integrated Health Solutions

PIPBHC provides states the opportunity to support community behavioral health and primary care organizations in partnering to provide essential primary care services to adults with serious mental illness. Because of this program, more than 100,000 people with serious mental health and addiction disorders have been screened and treated for diabetes, heart disease and other common and deadly illnesses at over 210 grantee sites in 40 states to help stem the alarming early death rate from these health conditions in this population. The MHLG request an additional \$500,000 for the PIPBHC TA Center to fund new technical assistance training and resources.

## **National Suicide Prevention Lifeline**

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline provides 24/7, free and confidential support for people in distress, prevention and crisis resources, and best practices for professionals. Increased funding would empower Lifeline to bolster funding to Call Centers nationwide, fortify national back-up call centers, increase chat capabilities, and increase infrastructure and administration of Lifeline services.

#### Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC) Expansion Grants

The Excellence in Mental Health and Addiction Treatment Act created an eight state Medicaid demonstration designed to provide intensive community-based mental health and addiction treatment services to low income persons through Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs). In FY2020, Congress appropriated \$200 million in CCBHC expansion grants, designed to further the reach of these effective and efficient organizations. These grants provide organizations opportunity to dramatically expand access to comprehensive and evidence-based mental health and addiction care by attesting to and offering the required array of services. These grants, for the first time, are eligible to clinics across all fifty states in the country.

# Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) Grants

SPF funding supports the Partnerships for Success Program and SPF Rx Program, which strengthen data-driven substance abuse prevention efforts that address underage drinking and prescription drug misuse among youth and young adults. Data show that states and communities receiving SPF funding have made improvements in reducing the impact of substance abuse in target areas, especially populations disproportionately impacted by the consequences of substance use.

#### Protection and Advocacy for Individuals with Mental Illness (PAIMI)

Protection and Advocacy agencies investigate abuse and neglect and rights violations in all public and private facilities and community settings, including hospitals, nursing facilities and group homes – and oversee the effectiveness of state agencies that license and regulate these programs. PAIMI program staff help ensure that people with mental illness have access to education, housing, employment, health care, and other necessary supports and services in the community so they can remain in their communities and be economically self-sufficient.

#### Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training (BHWET) Program

BHWET expands mental and behavioral health services for underserved populations by supporting pre-degree clinical internships and field placements for doctoral-level psychology students, master's-level social workers, school social workers, professional and school counselors, psychiatric-mental health nurse practitioners, occupational therapists, behavioral pediatrics, peer support specialists, training programs in psychiatry, substance use disorder prevention, and marriage and family therapists.

### **Mental and Behavioral Health Programs**

Programs funded through HRSA's Mental and Behavioral Health account include the Graduate Psychology Education (GPE) Program, which provides grants to accredited psychology doctoral, internship and postdoctoral training programs to support the interprofessional training of psychology graduate students while also providing mental and behavioral health services to underserved populations. MHLG request an additional \$5.0 million for GPE funds that may be used to support student, intern and postdoctoral stipends, curriculum development, model demonstration programs, faculty supervision and technical assistance.

#### Loan Repayment Program for Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Treatment Workforce

Authorized in the SUPPORT Act of 2018, this program would expand the substance abuse treatment workforce by providing loan repayment for eligible mental and behavioral health professionals working full-time in high-need communities or federally designated mental health professional shortage areas. Funding for this loan repayment program would help reduce this significant treatment gap by expanding the supply of qualified mental and behavioral health providers trained to deliver evidence-based SUD treatment services.

Authorized in the 21st Century CURES Act, this program would award grants to institutions such as medical schools and Federally qualified health centers to support training for medical residents and fellows in psychiatry and addiction medicine, as well as nurse practitioners, physician assistants and others who are willing to provide substance use disorder treatment in underserved communities.

Scientific advances have led to astounding discoveries about the mental health and substance use disorders. Continued investments in research will aid in developing rapid, effective treatments for behavioral health disorders and facilitate early identification and intervention. Given that mental health and substance use conditions frequently co-occur, MHLG requests that the above increase be distributed evenly among all NIH Institutes, including those of highest priority to the MHLG: National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH); National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA); and National Institute on Alcohol Abuse (NIAAA). The requested increase is equal to the cost of biomedical research inflation and will help to ensure that NIH-funded research can continue to improve our nation's health.
