Dear Representative Napolitano and Representative Fitzpatrick,

The undersigned members of the Mental Health Liaison Group (MHLG) write in support of the *Mental Health Services for Students Act*. This legislation would provide on-site school and community-based mental health services to public school students, helping schools and families to identify students who need mental health services and connect them with the care they need.

Young people are facing significant mental health challenges that, if unaddressed, can lead to difficulties at home and in school and interfere with a child's healthy development. The CDC estimates that as many as 1 out of 5 children experience a mental disorder and suicide continues to be a leading cause of death for youth and young adults ages 10-24.¹ In 2021, nearly 60% of female students reported having persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness, about 10% attempted suicide, and 25% made a suicide plan.² Unfortunately, 49.4% of youth suffering with mental health disorders do not receive treatment from mental health professionals.³

Early identification of mental health challenges is important so that children can get the help they need. Educators are often the first to notice if a student is struggling or if there are changes in behavior, making schools well-positioned to offer early interventions and mental health services.⁴ School-based mental health services can also reduce barriers to access for underserved populations.⁵

The *Mental Health Services for Students Act* would help schools address the mental health challenges facing young people by providing funding to strengthen school-based mental health services, including screening, treatment, and outreach programs. The bill provides funding for schools to build partnerships with health care providers, child welfare agencies, and other community-based service systems, as well as training for teachers to identify the signs and symptoms of mental disorders, risk of suicide, and trauma exposure. The bill also supports development of best practices for the delivery of mental health care in school-based settings.

The *Mental Health Services for Students Act* can play a pivotal role in comprehensively addressing youth mental health in schools and incentivizing school districts to take critical steps to improve student wellbeing. We thank you for introducing this important legislation, and we urge the bill's swift passage.
